The Holiday Food Drive raised 3,340 pounds of food and \$5,089 for The Perry Center.

PSL students volunteered 7,840 hours this year.

According to calculations provided by Innerview these hours of service are estimated as having a community impact value of \$228,693.



### Middle School Robert Knisely MS Principal



As we look back on another remarkable school year, I'd like to reflect on the journey we've taken together. In the fall, we

introduced students to the legendary Admiral Oliver Hazard Perry who, when facing the British in the Battle of Lake Erie, hoisted his now famous battle flag "Don't Give up the Ship." We asked our students and staff to embrace the grit and determination that Admiral Perry's flag represents. The challenges and projects that students were tasked with this school year were immense, but through it all, we embraced this motto. With this resilient spirit, we navigated uncharted waters and emerged stronger and wiser.

Our incredible staff members rose to this challenge as well, demonstrating unwavering commitment and creativity in delivering creative and authentic lessons all school year. In 5th grade, our students and teachers engaged in a wide variety of authentic experiences with a focus on science and service. Activities included sunflower seed harvesting from our outdoor classroom, waterway and local conservation studies, and a school-wide hurricane relief effort to aid a school in Florida. 6th grade students were able to release trout into the Grand River, experienced Egyptian mummification techniques using apples, harvested maple syrup, and hypothesized potential outcomes for events in ancient history. 7th grade students engaged in a Butterfly study and release, sharing their learning with 2nd grade students at Perry Elementary School. Additionally, 7th graders authored and published books, debated the hero or villain status of Martin Luther, and created a cuneiform alphabet. In 8th grade, our students utilized design learning to create and build scale monuments for Washington DC and earthquakeproof structures. They debated the ratification of the US Constitution as Thomas Jefferson and Alexander Hamilton, and sat on Foreign Policy teams to determine appropriate courses of action in our relations to other countries. These are just a small part of the authentic learning experiences



students were able to engage in during the 2022-23 school year in our core classes.

From STEM to Spanish, students were immersed in authentic learning. Often, these experiences result in real change in our school or community. This school year we had teams of Alpha Project students who studied the effects of stress on student learning. They proposed and created a student break-room that we look forward to utilizing next school year.

Beyond the academics, our students exhibited resilience determination, and personal growth in extracurricular activities. They participated in virtual competitions, explored new hobbies, and discovered talents they never knew they possessed. The spirit of "Don't Give Up the Ship" was evident in every endeavor, reminding us that setbacks are just steppingstones towards success.

As we bid farewell to the 2022-2023 school year, let us celebrate the achievements, growth, and resilience that define us. The challenges we faced have taught us valuable life lessons about perseverance, adaptability, and the importance of supporting one another. Although, winter/spring registration season is a great time to seek this information, it can be overwhelming and all-at-once; therefore, I encourage you to seek information at any time during the year from counselors, administration, or our career exploration specialist to help us place students in courses, clubs, job shadowing, and extracurricular options that are irresistibly engaging. Bottomline, when learners understand their interests and aptitudes and find how their course content aligns to their personal aspirations, they engage. As learners, we become excited for more. Recognize the many ways in which schools play a vital role in the overall development and preparation of students for their future endeavors.

Here are some "DID YOU KNOWS" to help you grab every opportunity at Perry, to help shape the happiness, drive, and resilience in our students and help them become their personal best.

#### **ELEMENTARY SCHOOL - DID YOU KNOW?**

- Collaborating in groups and learning life skills such as communication, problem solving, and serving others begins as early as elementary school. Ask teachers about problem-based learning in science and social studies. Get community experts involved in this inquiry.
- All PES students are involved in a weekly exploratory class called PEEPS Service Learning.
- Join after school clubs such as Video Club, Mighty Girls, or Kindness Club.
- Join a team at the Perry Recreation Department. There are new sign-ups every season.
- Join the Perry Athletic Community (PAC) and swim, work-out, or walk the track as a family.

#### MIDDLE SCHOOL - DID YOU KNOW?

• This is quite possibly the MOST critical stage of learning and we seek for students to connect with positive adult role models in clubs, outings, through fitness, or family events - so join one of the 17 clubs at PMS.

- Unmonitored Social Media and gaming is one of the biggest reasons students can spiral in middle school. Did you know we can also support parents or grandparents to understand tech options and how to monitor healthy habits?
- Leadership Lake County (yes, already becoming a leader at a county level) begins at middle school.
- Begin surveying your own Career Interest and Aptitude data with our Career Exploration Specialist and teachers and then go seek careers at Share your Genius Day, Job Shadow Day in 8th grade, or use it to create your own project around content in a class that provides problembased learning and access to learn with input from a community or global leader.
- Think you're ready to take an accelerated course or a course in a trades field as a middle schooler? Yes, at PMS you too can take a College Credit Course as a 7th/8th grader.

#### HIGH SCHOOL - DID YOU KNOW?

- Use your Career Interest and Aptitude data that you have been monitoring since middle school and build a schedule aligned to your dreams. Ready to begin shadowing your favorite job considerations? See a counselor or the Career Exploration Specialist TODAY.
- Don't see the advanced course or trades course you want to schedule? Seek a CCP (College Credit Plus) course online or in person for FREE and begin to earn college credit (fall/winter/summer).
- Take a course where problem-based learning and working with experts in the business field of that content area are possible. See the course registration where this will be noted.
- Become a leader in your state or community through service and leadership. As a junior, apply to Buckeye Boys/Girls State or Perry Service Learning (PSL).
- High School teachers hold office hours every day. Seek the help you need. We are here.
- You can earn career certifications at high school. Yes, place that on your college resume or take it to a job interview. Perry increases each year in industryrecognized certifications obtained by our students in IT, Childcare, Google, MS Office, HVAC, Welding, STNA/ Nursing, SERVSAFE, Entrepreneurship, OSHA, and more.




